

SCHOOL FEES


All school fees for the 2023-24 school year are due by the end of September. All payments can be made on School Cash Online. If you prefer to pay by cheque or cash, you can always do so by visiting our office. Fees for Grades 1-6 are \$25.00 and the Kindergarten fee is \$51.00. Thank you in advance for your prompt attention to this matter.

TRANSPORTATION

All students who are registered to ride the bus will receive a bus pass the first week of school. We suggest bus passes be attached securely to backpacks as student's are required to have a valid pass to board the bus.

PICTURE DAY

Lifetouch School Photography will be at the school on Tuesday, October 3, 2023, to take student photos. All students will have their individual picture taken. Proofs will be sent home approximately two weeks later. At that time, you may choose the package you wish to purchase. All orders are placed through Lifetouch online.

Picture retakes are scheduled for Thursday, November 16. If your child was absent or you are not satisfied with your pictures, please return the proof package and new pictures will be taken.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS

Supervision

Morning supervision begins at 8:30 am and our first bell rings at 8:42 am. Students are asked to meet their teacher at their designated place outside each morning. Students will be dismissed at 3:47pm Mon – Thurs, and 12:42pm on Friday. We ask parents to pick up their child promptly as there is no supervision after school.

Attendance

If your child(ren) will be absent from school for any reason, please contact the office at 403-327-5028 to let us know. You can leave a message or email olaoffice@holyspirit.ab.ca All unexcused absences are followed up with a phone call.

Medication

If a student requires medication to be administered at school proper documentation must be completed by a doctor and parent. The forms are available in the office. These forms must be on file before any medication can be given. The school does not give out any over the counter medication such as Tylenol or cough medicine and we do not use antiseptic cream such as polysporin.

Contact Information

If there are any changes to your child's data, i.e.: address, phone number, emergency contacts, email address, etc. please inform the office. This information is vital so that the school can contact you in case of an emergency.

Nutrition Breaks

All students eat in their classrooms during nutrition breaks. There are <u>no microwaves</u> available so please pack lunches accordingly. Please ensure you send enough food for both breaks. If you send food that requires a spoon or fork, please send them. We **DO NOT** supply these items.

Food Allergies

In our school community there are students who have potentially life-threatening allergies (anaphylaxis) to certain foods. It is important to be aware and respectful of those who may have food allergies. Please inform your teachers and school staff about any allergies your child may have. Before bringing food items to the classroom, check with the homeroom teacher if there are any items to avoid. By being mindful and considerate of food allergies in the classroom, we can create a safe and inclusive environment for all students.







NOTICE TO PARENT OR GUARDIAN OF RELIGIOUS PERMEATION

Section 58.1 of the *Education Act* requires a school board to give notice to a parent or guardian when courses of study, education programs, institutional materials, instruction or exercises include subject matter that deals primarily and explicitly with religion. All of the schools in this division are Catholic Separate Schools, the essential purpose of which is to fully permeate Catholic theology, philosophy, practices and beliefs, the principles of the Gospel and teachings of the Catholic Church, in all aspects of school life, including in the curriculum of every subject taught, both in and outside of formal religion classes, celebrations and exercises. FAIR NOTICE LETTER

Dear Parents / Guardians,

The Holy Spirit Catholic School Division is committed to providing safe learning environments for all students, staff, school visitors and community members. When a student behaves inappropriately, principals use progressive discipline to help a student take responsibility for their actions, change their behavior and learn from their mistakes.

When students' behaviors pose a potential threat to safety or serious harm, the Southwest Alberta Regional Violence Risk Threat Assessment Protocol (VTRA) helps principals take further steps to protect the well-being of students and staff. The protocol helps schools respond quickly to threatening incidents such as: possession of a weapon or a replica weapon, bomb threats or plans, verbal, written or electronic (internet, text) threats to kill or injure oneself or others or other threats of violence, fire setting.

The Southwest Alberta Regional VTRA Protocol outlines how a school responds immediately to threatening behavior. Principals may first bring together a School Threat Assessment Team, which ideally includes the principal / associate principal, a school based counsellor / jurisdictional lead and police of jurisdiction. If the situation is serious the principal may also consult the Superintendent of Schools and call in members of the Community Threat Assessment Team. This community team may include representatives of community agencies who work with us to keep our schools safer such as, but not limited to, local police, children's mental health organizations or Child and Family Services. Parents / guardians will be notified as soon as possible in the Stage I - VTRA Process. If parents / guardians cannot be reached, but a concern for safety still exists due to threatening behavior, the threat assessment may still proceed. Personal information shared throughout this process will respect and balance each individual's right to privacy with the need to ensure the safety of all.

This letter complies with procedure 2 of Administrative Procedure 322: Violence Threat / Risk Assessment (V-TRA) Protocol, which states that parents / guardians will be provided with "fair notice" that each threat will be taken seriously. Pilgrims of Hope



St. Vincent de Paul was born in France in 1581, and lived in the countryside with his family until the age of 15, when he entered the seminary to train as a priest. He didn't start out intending to become a great saint; in fact, it took him quite a while to figure out how to really live out his vocation. Over time, his heart was changed and became more compassionate towards the poor. Once he began working simply to respond to the basic needs of those around him from a Christian stance, his work blossomed. He worked with the *Daughters of Charity*, a group of lay women who worked extensively with the poor and sick. They collected donations for distribution that created homes for abandoned children, a hospice for the elderly, and freed galley slaves.

He can be a great model for us in our daily lives then, if we are struggling to determine our vocation or to find ways to contribute to the common good. In all of his endeavours, St. Vincent de Paul started by recognizing and promoting the dignity of those around him. This legacy lives on today, in the *Society of St. Vincent de Paul*, founded in 1833 by his followers. This Catholic society is open to all who want to love and serve their neighbour. In Canada the <u>Society of St. Vincent de Paul</u> serves more than 350,000 people each year.



"Building" In Our Schools

Corporal Works of Mercy Shelter the Homeless —

Speaking in Washington, D.C. in 2015, Pope Francis said:

I can imagine Joseph, with his wife about to have a child, with no shelter, no home, no place to stay. The Son of God came into this world as a homeless person. The Son of God knew what it was to start life without a roof over his head. We can imagine what Joseph must have been thinking. How is it that the Son of God has no home? Why are we homeless, why don't we have housing? These are questions which many of you may ask, and do ask, every day. Like Saint Joseph, you may ask: Why are we homeless, without a place to live? And those of us who do have a home, a roof over our heads, would also do well to ask: Why do these, our brothers and sisters, have no place to live? Why are these brothers and sisters of ours homeless?

People experience homelessness for many different reasons. Our faith encourages us to reach out and encounter those without the stability of a home, affirming their human dignity, and assisting them in seeking solutions to the challenges they face.

What might some practical suggestions be?

- help elderly neighbours care for their homes and do repairs
- support and/or volunteer at a homeless shelter
- support and/or volunteer for charitable agencies who care for the homeless, build homes, and provide support in the wake of natural disasters
- · consider becoming a foster parent

Dignity of the Human Person

Through the course of this year, we will look each month at one of the Catholic Social Teachings. The aim of Catholic Social Teaching is to shine the light of the Gospel on our contemporary world, allowing us as disciples of Christ to look at the world around us with new eyes, and to take action.

All of the Catholic Social Teachings are rooted in the inherent dignity of the human person, created in the image and likeness of God. Our belief in the sanctity of human life and inherent dignity are the foundation of our moral vision for society. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church notes:

"Being in the image of God the human individual possesses the dignity of a person, who is not just something, but someone."

- · How strong is your belief in your own human dignity?
- When you interact with family members and friends, can you honour and reverence the dignity of each person?
- Are there some people whose dignity you find challenging to uphold?
 How could you pray about overcoming these obstacles?

Gospel Readings

September 3, 2023 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Gospel Reading: Matthew 16:21-27

"...You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do." — Matthew 16:23

If you had to leave your house in a hurry, what five things would you take? What if you only had time to take just one of them? What would be the most important thing to save? In our Gospel today, St. Peter tries to stop Jesus from going into danger. He has decided that Jesus' life is the most important thing to save. But Jesus knows that saving his own life isn't the most important thing. He knows that eventually some people will kill him for speaking the truth, speaking out against injustice, and loving everyone, even those whom others don't think are worthy of love. But Jesus is willing to die rather than change the way he lives, and he knows that God can make new life come out of death.

Have you ever experienced a difficult situation only to find out later that God had a plan to use that for your good?

Lord, when I am struggling, help me to trust that you know what's best and you will use all things for my good, even those that are painful right now.

September 10, 2023

23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Gospel Reading: Matthew 18:15-20

"For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them." — Matthew 18:20

When we discover someone is doing something wrong, how do we respond? Do we go to him and try to help him improve? Do we talk about him behind his back? Do we just ignore what he's doing and let him get into deeper trouble?

In our Gospel today, Jesus shows us that we have a responsibility to help each other improve. That's hard to do because our good intentions might be seen as butting in when it's not our business. But Jesus reminds us that he will be with us and wants us to care enough to make a difference in other people's lives. If we ask for his help, he will give us the right words to use. We must always speak the truth in love.

Discuss together what loving words you can use to help someone get back on the path to God. Consider times when you were corrected by someone and how you felt.



Prayer:

Please, dear Jesus, increase in me your gifts of courage and humility so that I may give and take constructive criticism with an open and loving heart.

September 17, 2023 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Gospel Reading: Matthew 18:21-35

"Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive him?" — Matthew 18:21

When someone hurts us, it's very common to want revenge. We often feel it's unfair if that person does not experience the same hurt inflicted on us.

In our Gospel today, Jesus tells us that his way is different. Instead of looking for ways to get back at someone, we should remember that Jesus forgave us even when we didn't deserve it. Just before Jesus died on the cross, he said to his Father "Forgive them, for they know not what they are doing." What an example He gave us! Even in the midst of suffering like a criminal, even though he was completely innocent, he forgave not only those who inflicted the pain that day but all people throughout the ages—even us. So, are we to forgive only once in a while? Jesus said there is no limit to the amount of times we should forgive others. For surely he didn't limit his forgiveness of us!

Pray today for people in prison and those who have been hurt by their crimes.



Prayer:

Lord, it's hard to forgive when I experience injustice. Only with your help can I imitate your great love. Come to me when I need to forgive someone, dear Jesus.

25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Gospel Reading: Matthew 20:1-16

"Thus, the last will be first, and the first will be last," — Matthew 20:16

In the Gospel today, we hear a parable about a landowner who pays all his workers the same amount of money, even though they did not all work the same amount of time. We may wonder why Jesus seems to be okay with that—isn't it unfair?

I remember when my son made the basketball team in junior high. Every day after school he and his teammates practiced for two hours. One day, a new student came to his school. The coach wanted him to feel welcome so he made him the starter for the next game. Without doing all the work the rest of the team had done, he received the same reward. Do you think that was fair? The team DID NOT! The following year my son started high school and his art and music teachers gave him opportunities to shine. He had natural talent in these areas, but so did other students. Was it fair? Perhaps the Gospel message is that instead of measuring our blessings against what others get, we should appreciate the many ways we are blessed.

Have you ever been jealous of someone else's success? Remember, God loves us all... in different ways!



Prayer:

Lord, please help me to appreciate your gifts, even if things seem unfair at times. Give me the patience to wait and see what generous ways you love me.
